IALEIA CO-FOUNDED

The International Association of Law Enforcement Intelligence Analysts (IALEIA) was co-founded by Mr. Brian S. Boyd (P.O. Box 876, Ben Franklin Station, Washington, D.C. 20044) and his Canadian counterpart Mr. William F. "Bill" Beamish (Vancouver, British Columbia (604) 687-8721). Both Mr. Boyd and Mr. Beamish have spent the majority of their careers in jobs related to intelligence. It is their backgrounds in this field which affords this newly formed Association wide sponsorship by the intelligence and law enforcement communities in both Canada and the United States, as well as in countries such as Germany, Australia, and France.

BRIAN S. BOYD began his career in 1967 with the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) as an intern/research assistant. In 1970, he became a Program Manager at the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration. In 1974, he went to work for the Office of Intelligence at DEA. Presently, he is Supervisor in Charge of the Strategic Intelligence Branch for the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

Mr. Boyd has authored journals, publications and training programs, and has taught intelligence extensively in the field of law enforcement. He is a member of the IACP, and a Chapter President of the Special Forces Decade Association.

He has a BA in Criminal Justice from the University of Maryland, and an MA in Administration of Justice, Forensic Science, from George Washington University.

Mr. Boyd is also Detachment Commander of a Special Forces "A" Team in the National Guard. WILLIAM F. "BILL" BEAMISH held the position of Constable, Vancouver City Police, for four years (1970-1974) before joining the British Columbia Coordinated Law Enforcement ment Unit's Policy Analysis Division in May 1974. He is presently the Manager of the Strategic Intelligence Section within the Policy Analysis Division, a post he has held since July 1, 1979. He is tasked with the responsibility of working with the law enforcement community to identify organized crime activity in British Columbia. Prior to attaining his present position, Mr. Beamish held various jobs in the area of drug trade research.

He is a member of the IACP and the International Narcotics Enforcement Officers' Association (INEOA).

Mr. Beamish received his BA from Simon Fraser University, Vancouver, and he is currently enrolled in a three-year program in Public Administration at the University of Victoria.

SUGGESTED READING

Where does the Mafia operate? Practically everywhere. VICIOUS CIRCLES exposes Mafia rackets and reveals that the Mafia, and the crime syndicates that it dominates, have control over much of what the public regards as legitimate business.

Through tape recordings of the conversations of businessmen and underworld figures, through police reports, public records, trial transcripts, and personal interviews, the author reconstructs Mob takeovers of the meat industry, the lunch wagon business, cheese-processing plants, garment factories, banks, stockbrockerages, and teamsters, butchers, and longshoremen's unions.

MOSLER SAFE COMPANY

The Mosler Safe Company, manufacturers of safes, security devices, and alarm systems, through their Mosler Anti-Crime Bureau (MACB), has developed several anti-crime programs. These programs are geared to strengthen financial institutions against criminal attacks and to discover any physical and operational weaknesses in their anti-crime defenses. The programs can, however, be beneficial to all law enforcement/security personnel.

One MACB program is an on-site security audit service which provides the institution with: (1) a complete physical and operational survey of their defenses against criminal attack; (2) a determination of compliance with the security provisions of the Bank Protection Act (if applicable); and (3) a complete and confidential written report. MACB auditors are experts in the field of financial-institution security.

Another program offers two-day seminars covering various topics that would be of interest to security officers/investigators. Agenda subjects range from different types of security devices to sophisticated attacks on vaults, safes, and alarm systems, to case histories of bank burglaries and the problem and solution of kidnapping and bomb threats.

MACB has also produced two new training films. The first, "Silent Alarm Response," explores the life and death problem of dealing with a bank robbery in progress. This film dramatically demonstrates how financial institutions and police departments can work together to decrease the danger of a nasty hostage standoff or the shooting of responding law enforcement officers. A training manual for classroom instruction and 45 crime scene photos are included in this authoritative, 30-minute, color/sound, 16mm film package.

The second film package concerns extortions against banks through hostage-taking, kidnappings, and bomb threats. Its title, "Extortion: No Time To Panic," emphasizes the film's message that pre-planning is absolutely necessary to minimize the chance of personal injury and significant financial loss in such an emergency. A complete training manual for classroom instruction is included in this 30 minute color/sound, 16mm film package.

IACP

IACP is offering several courses within the next few months pertaining to law enforcement. Of particular interest to criminal intelligence specialists is the course titled Management of the Intelligence Function being held October 19-23, 1981, at Daytona Beach, Florida. The course topics include the intelligence function, intelligence operations, organized crime, conspiracy investigations, unit evaluations, and the legal background of intelligence operations.

Enrollment in the course is limited and participants are accepted on a first-come-first-served basis up to thirty days before the start of the program. The tuition is \$325 for IACP members and \$375 for non-members. Telephone IACP toll-free at 800/638-5085 to reserve a place in the course.

MEMBERSHIP ELIGIBILITY

The widespread interest sparked by the forming of IALEIA has generated a tremendous amount of incoming correspondence, much of it concerned with membership criteria. Association bylaws specifying the criteria are still being drafted for ratification at the First Annual Meeting, but the present intention is to continue with membership categories which were initially defined as follows:

- (a) REGULAR MEMBERS (including CHARTER MEMBERS and LIFE MEMBERS): Eligibility for Regular Membership in IALEIA shall be limited to persons actively or formerly employed in a specialized criminal intelligence capacity by a governmental entity.
- (b) ASSOCIATE MEMBERS: Eligibility for Associate Membership in IALEIA shall be limited to persons who demonstrate support of the stated purpose, goals and functions of IALEIA.
- (c) HONORARY MEMBERS: Eligibility for Honorary Membership in IALEIA shall be limited to persons who demonstrate support of the stated purpose, goals and functions of IALEIA, and who are recommended for such status by an IALEIA officer or director.
- (d) CORPORATE MEMBERS: Eligibility for Corporate Membership in IALEIA shall be limited to non-governmental corporate, public or non-profit organizations and group entities which demonstrate support of IALEIA concerns.
- (e) SPONSORING AGENCIES: Eligibility for Sponsoring Agency membership status shall be limited to official governmental entities which support IALEIA concerns.

GROWING MEMBERSHIP

There seems to be little doubt that IALEIA is rapidly filling the long recognized need for an international organization to represent the professional interests of criminal intelligence specialists. Since the first public announcement of the forming of the Association last December, active participation by individuals, public agencies and corporate sponsors has grown explosively.

Even though the initial formal organizing conference will not be held until later this month, membership applications and agency inquiries already number in the hundreds. The association has now enrolled active members in five nations, including thirteen states plus the District of Columbia and Guam. Members accepted to date represent 24 separate law enforcement agencies encompassing seven U.S. agencies in six federal departments (Justice, Treasury, Labor, Air Force, Army, and Defense), as well as eight state or provincial-level agencies, seven major municipal agencies, and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the Ontario Provisional Police, the British Columbia Ministry of the Attorney General, and the Australian Federal Police. In addition to individual membership applications, official inquiries have been received from numerous other domestic and foreign agencies.

Plans are underway for publication of a general membership directory, and the development of regional membership chapters will be among the agenda items at the First Annual Meeting this month in New Orleans. Members in the states of California and Florida have expressed interest in forming the first local chapters.
